because he remains with you and will be in you. ¹⁸ "I will not leave you as orphans; I am coming to you. ¹⁹ In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me. Because I live, you will live too. ²⁰ On that day you will know that I am in my Father, you are in me, and I am in you.

²³ Jesus answered, "If anyone loves me, he will keep my word. My Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him. ²⁴ The one who doesn't love me will not keep my words. The word that you hear is not mine but is from the Father who sent me. ²⁵ "I have spoken these things to you while I remain with you. ²⁶ But the Counselor, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and remind you of everything I have told you.

We all face things that seem complicated, but with enough work and determination we can usually figure them out. Yet some things are simply beyond our ability to grasp. Your little brother may be learning to count, but we don't expect him to be able to understand algebra. It's not that your younger brother is dumb. Instead, we know that his brain is still developing, and it will be awhile before abstract ideas like advanced math are within his ability to grasp. But with hard work and good teachers, your brother will be able to understand it one day.

One subject that remains beyond the ability of all people to grasp is the Trinity. A key truth in Scripture is that God has revealed Himself as the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit—three persons, but one God. Our finite minds cannot fully comprehend how three can be one, but we can still appreciate the beauty of the nature of God.

From the time God revealed Himself through the law to Moses and the Israelites, God made it clear that there is one God. Before they would enter the promised land, which was occupied by pagan nations who believed in many gods, Moses reminded the people, "Listen, Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength" (Deut. 6:4-5). Today, this is still true—there is one God, and He exists eternally as Father, Son, and Spirit.

Day One **JOHN 1:16**

As followers of Christ, we are familiar with the idea of grace. We must be because we are saved only by the grace of God. Grace specifically refers to God's giving us a gift which is totally undeserved. Specifically, He's given us His love and favor. Because every person has sinned (with Jesus' being the only exception), not one of us deserves God's blessings. Still, He has chosen to bless us in many ways. All people are subject to the goodness of God—we enjoy life, sunshine and rain, relationships with others, the air we breathe, and much more. These are all expressions of His grace. However, for those who trust God and follow in obedience, we've received "grace upon grace"—God's good gifts in ways that are beyond comprehension. If you belong to Christ, you've received not only earthly blessings, but eternal blessings—salvation, hope, and a relationship with God.

How specifically has God blessed you?

Day Two **JOHN 1:17**a



The law was given for a couple reasons. First, it gave God's people a picture of His character and helped them understand how they could fulfill their purpose of reflecting Him to the world. Second, it demanded holiness and revealed clearly that no one could live up to its standards. Though God was kind to give the law—otherwise the people would have been left without an understanding of God's expectations—the law was not an expression of grace. If we ever think we can work to earn God's favor, we're making a tragic mistake. We can never be good enough. Only Jesus did that.

Why are people often tempted to believe that, if we are good enough, God will be pleased with us?

Day Three JOHN 1:17b

Though the law revealed something of God's nature and character, it wasn't the full picture of God. The law was and is truth. It revealed that people are truly fallen and incapable of making right what sin has broken, but it was never intended to be the full picture. This is why it was necessary that Jesus came. Sin separated us from God, and the only way we would be reconciled was that Jesus paid the price for our sins on the cross. This is the ultimate gift and is the clearest expression of God's grace. Jesus is the truth—the true and clear picture of God's nature and character. He is also grace—the gift that made our salvation possible. Whereas the law only partially revealed God's character, Jesus is the full and perfect picture, revealing to us both God's grace and truth.

How is Jesus the expression of both God's grace and truth?

Day Four JOHN 1:18a

The Bible teaches that God isn't a physical being in the ways that humans are. God is immaterial and invisible—He is spirit (John 4:24)—and this means that we can't see Him physically with our eyes. Rather, we "see" God by understanding His nature and character. Still, this verse implies that it is impossible that any person would ever fully grasp the infinite God, whose thoughts are far higher than our thoughts and whose ways are altogether different than our ways. Prophets heard God speak and delivered the messages to the people. Priests entered into the Most Holy Place where they stood in the very presence of God. Still, no man has ever fully known or ever seen God.

What does it mean that God is spirit?

If we can't see God, how do we know Him?

Day Five JOHN 1:18b



Despite than no human has ever seen God, Jesus has. Jesus has lived alongside the Father for eternity—a position of being equal—and is Himself God. Whereas the prophets delivered the law and delivered God's messages on behalf of God, none had ever known God fully. However, Jesus did. When He came to earth. Jesus was able to communicate the truth of God in a way that no one before Him ever could, because not only had He seen God, Jesus is God. His teaching reflected God in ways that the law never could, and His life reflected God as no other human could. For us to fulfill God's purposes for our lives, specifically reflecting His nature because we're created in His image, we must look to Jesus. He is the only one ever to have seen God, and He is the only perfect picture of the nature of God.

> GENESIS 1:1-5.26-31

¹In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. 2 Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness covered the surface of the watery depths, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the surface of the waters. 3 Then God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. 4 God saw that the light was good, and God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵ God called the light "day," and the darkness he called "night." There was an evening, and there was a morning: one day.

²⁶Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, according to our likeness. They will rule the fish of the sea, the birds of the sky, the livestock, the whole earth, and the creatures that crawl on the earth." 27 So God created man in his own image; he created him in the image of God; he created them male and female. ²⁸ God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful, multiply, fill the earth, and subdue it. Rule the fish of the sea, the birds of the sky, and every creature that crawls on the earth." ²⁹ God also said. "Look. I have given you every seed-bearing plant on the surface of the entire earth and every tree whose fruit contains seed. This will be food for you, ³⁰ for all the wildlife of the earth, for every bird of the sky, and for every creature that crawls on the earth—everything having the breath of life in it—I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. 31 God saw all that he had made. and it was very good indeed. Evening came and then morning: the sixth day.

God is Creator, and all creation is a result of His work and exists to glorify Him.

I have six kids, and every Friday after dinner we evaluate the way each one has handled their responsibilities, including schoolwork and chores, as well as their general attitude throughout the week. Based on their self-assessment and that of their brothers and sisters, I give them their week's allowance.

Although none of their chores are terribly difficult, there is inevitably at least one kid who doesn't get their full allowance because they failed to follow through on something that should have been simple and routine. For example, my 12-year-old son has the responsibility of taking the trash out each time it fills up, but I can't count the number of times he has "forgotten" to do it.

Many young people dread responsibility, but we know firsthand that as we grow older, responsibility is handed to us in greater measure. We need to see that responsibility is not a bad thing! From the very beginning, God made us to handle the responsibilities He's entrusted to us, and He's given us the tools we need to do it well. Now it's up to us to understand specifically what God expects of us and to live it out.



Day One

ECCLESIASTES 12:13a

Ecclesiastes is a book that was written about the meaning of life. Solomon tried essentially all that life had to offer—seeking pleasure, entertainment, wine, possessions, knowledge, fulfillment in work, and more—and his goal was to find out what might give lasting satisfaction and fulfillment. Given that he was the richest man on earth and worth an estimated \$2 trillion. Solomon could do anything or have anything he wanted. Literally! So he tried it all, and after a lifetime of seeking to understand life's meaning, Solomon wrote down his perspectives. When he says, "When all has been heard," he's referring to his consideration of all the things he'd experienced. And Solomon came to some very clear conclusions about the purpose and meaning of life.

Day Two

ECCLESIASTES 12:13b



After he'd tried finding satisfaction in everything life had to offer, Solomon summed up his conclusions in this: Fear God and keep his commands. Many times, when we consider the idea of fearing God, we may be inclined to think of giving God reverence and respect. This certainly applies, but it doesn't begin to cover what Solomon is talking about. Here's the truth. No matter what we may experience during our time on earth, all people die. More importantly, we will all stand before God in judgment, and to know we will be judged according to the ways we've lived on earth (including our thoughts, desires, and motives) should provoke a healthy level of fear. In light of this, we should obey God in everything.

Day Three **ECCLESIASTES 12:13c**

To fear God and obey His commands is certainly for all people. But this isn't all this verse means. Another way to say it is "this is the whole of humanity" or "this is the whole reason for our existence." When God created us in His image, it was so we would reflect His nature and character to the world. He gave the law to His people to help them know Him and to help them know how to live in order to reflect Him. Obeying the law is the way to fulfill our purpose of reflecting God, and the inverse is also true. Failure to obey the law is to fail to fulfill our purpose. If we want to experience the purpose and meaning God has for us—which is the only true meaning—we must obey God. This applies to all people.

Day Four **ECCLESIASTES 12:14a**

In our lives, we will do things we're not necessarily proud of. We will use our words in ways that hurt others. We will behave in ways that cause conflict, embarrass our families or ourselves, or that cause injury, physically, emotionally, and spiritually. We may not always pay close attention to the ways we "act," as this verse says. However, we need to be completely aware that God is aware of every action, every word, every work, and one day we will be required to give an account of every one. There may be times when we know we've done wrong, and we think we've gotten away with it. However, this is never the way it works. The truth is that God will bring every act to judgment. For the good we've done, God stands ready to offer reward. And for the wrongs we've committed, God requires a price that Jesus has already paid.


Day Five

ECCLESIASTES 12:14b



Not only does God judge our actions that are outwardly visible, including our words. He also judges the things that aren't seen—our thoughts, desires, and motives. In one sense, people can know the things that are inside our hearts by listening to the ways we speak and observing the ways we live, as the things we express always flow from our internal condition. However, in another sense, we can't even fully know ourselves, and as Jeremiah asks, "The heart is more deceitful than anything else, and incurable—who can understand it?" (Jer. 17:9). The answer: God understands the details about even the secret things in our hearts. And He will judge us according to all of it. So let's be sure to work on aligning not only the ways we live, but also our hearts, to God's standards.

> ISAIAH 59:1-13

¹Indeed, the LORD'S arm is not too weak to save, and his ear is not too deaf to hear. ² But your iniquities are separating you from your God, and your sins have hidden his face from you so that he does not listen. ³ For your hands are defiled with blood and your fingers, with iniquity; your lips have spoken lies, and your tongues mutter injustice. 4 No one makes claims justly; no one pleads honestly. They trust in empty and worthless words; they conceive trouble and give birth to iniquity. 5 They hatch viper's eggs and weave spider's webs. Whoever eats their eggs will die; crack one open, and a viper is hatched. 6 Their webs cannot become clothing, and they cannot cover themselves with their works. Their works are sinful works, and violent acts are in their hands. ⁷ Their feet run after evil, and they rush to shed innocent blood. Their thoughts are sinful

thoughts; ruin and wretchedness are in their paths. ⁸ They have not known the path of peace, and there is no justice in their ways. They have made their roads crooked; no one who walks on them will know peace. ⁹ Therefore justice is far from us, and righteousness does not reach us. We hope for light, but there is darkness; for brightness, but we live in the night. 10 We grope along a wall like the blind; we grope like those without eyes. We stumble at noon as though it were twilight; we are like the dead among those who are healthy. 11 We all growl like bears and moan like doves. We hope for justice, but there is none; for salvation, but it is far from us. 12 For our transgressions have multiplied before you, and our sins testify against us. For our transgressions are with us, and we know our iniquities: 13 transgression and deception against the LORD, turning away from following our God, speaking oppression and revolt, conceiving and uttering lying words from the heart.

Some people are experts at "no." Young children, when they're asked to eat their broccoli, shake their head from side to side in an emphatic, "No!"

Nobody has to teach us to do this. Admittedly, in any number of ways, I said no to my parents many times growing up, and chances are, you do too. By saying no, we are in essence rejecting the instructions of those in positions of authority. We are born with the inclination toward living pridefully and doing the things we want. The truth is that we just don't like being told what to do, and this goes beyond our relationship with our parents. We also reject God's authority by saying no to His instructions and commands. This is called sin, and we are born with a nature that leads us to sin.

Saying no to our parents often leads to punishment, and the same is true when we say no to God's commands. No amount of good on our part will cancel out that punishment, but thankfully, God did not leave us in this state.

All people have sinned, and have been separated from God, but we can be restored to a relationship with Him when we trust in Jesus and turn from our sin.

A good way to think about sin is that we're aiming the arrow of our lives at the bullseye of God's holiness, and if we miss the target even once, we're sinners. All people have sinned, plain and simple. There's nothing we can do to repair the brokenness in our lives or restore our relationship with God. Thankfully, Jesus did all that was necessary to pay the price for our sin, and when we trust in Him, we can be forgiven.

> CHRIST

For us to experience salvation in Jesus, we must confess our sins. Confess means to agree with God about what's true, and it's true that we've all sinned.

Pray to God and admit that you are a sinner who has fallen short of God's standard. Confess your sin to Him and ask for forgiveness. He is faithful to forgive when we are humble.



Day One JAMES 1:13a

Because we live in a broken world, we will face difficult circumstances. And because we are fallen people, we will sometimes be tempted to sin. Because most people generally like to think of themselves as good, we're often quick to blame others for the things that go wrong in our lives—we certainly don't want to blame ourselves. We may even be tempted to blame God for all the ways our lives are difficult. However, this is not the case. In Matthew 4:3, Satan is called the tempter. He confronted Jesus in the wilderness and tempted Jesus to live in ways that were outside God's will. Satan is known for tempting people to live in ways that are contrary to God's purposes, which is altogether contrary to God's character. God, on the other hand, desires for us to live in line with His will and never tempts us to do otherwise. Whenever we may be tempted to blame God for the difficult things we may face in this life, we need to understand clearly, God does not tempt us to sin.

What difficult things are you facing now which may tempt you to sin?

Day Two **JAMES 1:13b**



God loves things that are righteous and good. He also hates things that are evil. Temptation is specifically the desiring of something that is evil. This means not only that God isn't tempted, but He can't be tempted by evil. We may ask, "Didn't Jesus experience temptation?" The answer is yes. In the incarnation, Jesus laid aside certain divine powers and privileges, and He took on our flesh and weaknesses, entering into our experience so He could be our perfect High Priest and sympathize with us in our suffering. Jesus is fully divine and He is fully human. And whereas His human nature was subject to temptation, the divine never could be. Because God loves good and hates evil, it's not possible that He would experience temptation to sin. Based on this, He never tempts us to sin.

Day Three **JAMES 1:14**

Temptation promises something good, but it's all a lie. This is the way Satan worked from the time of the fall, and it's the way he still works today. "Drawn away and enticed" refers specifically to the way a fisherman catches a fish. There's a piece of food that looks tasty and delicious, but buried inside is a hook, and once it becomes lodged in the fish's lip, there's no escaping. Temptation is always an appeal to our own evil desires—our desires to live selfishly and indulgently instead of according to God's will—and looks on the outside to be something that will make us happy. However, inside there's a hidden hook that creates pain and drags us into danger, destruction, and ultimately death.

When has something appealed to you but turned out to be something else?

Why are we tempted to buy into the trap of sin?

Day Four JAMES 1:15a

We're often inclined to think of sin as "doing" bad things. We see drinking and smoking as sin. We see cursing or behaving inappropriately with members of the opposite sex as sin. We see disobedience to parents, being unkind to others at school, looking at pornography, stealing, lying, skipping church, and many other things as sin. And this is right. However, it's not all sin is. Sin isn't simply an act, but it's the result of a long process that takes place in our hearts. Sin begins when we fail to desire God and the good things to which He's called us, and instead, we choose to live selfishly. Disobedience to parents is saying, "I don't care what you say, I'm going to do what I want." Being unkind to others is the same as, "I don't care how my words or actions make you feel." Any sin is rebellion against God and His standards and is the expression of our heart's choosing to live for self instead of God.

Consider a sin you struggle with. How can you see that it's the result of a process?

What are the biggest ways you are tempted to live selfishly instead of for God and others?

Day Five JAMES 1:15b



When Adam and Eve sinned, the result was their being cut off from a whole relationship with God, and in that moment, they died spiritually. They didn't immediately experience the full consequences of their choices, but the end was inevitable. When we sin, just like Adam and Eve, we may not always see immediate consequences, but we need to understand that the consequence of all sin is ultimately death. Thankfully, Jesus has made a way that we can be spared sin's eternal consequences. Scripture teaches that to be saved, we must confess our sins, we must believe in Jesus as the sacrifice for our sins, and we must live by faith in Him. We can never make things right ourselves. Thankfully, Jesus did, and when we trust in Him for salvation, we will be spared from sin's ultimate consequence—death.

- How did you come to understand your own sin?
- What does it take to be saved?



> JOHN 19:8-11,16b-18,28-30

⁸When Pilate heard this statement, he was more afraid than ever. 9 He went back into the headquarters and asked Jesus, "Where are you from?" But Jesus did not give him an answer. 10 So Pilate said to him, "Do you refuse to speak to me? Don't you know that I have the authority to release you and the authority to crucify you?" 11 "You would have no authority over me at all," Jesus answered him, "if it hadn't been given you from above. This is why the one who handed me over to you has the greater sin."


When we finally get to step back and see the results of all the hard work, it's an incredible feeling! Otherwise, why would we go through all the trouble? Even if it took four times longer than it should have, we can say, "I did it!"

We can't fix everything, though. Sometimes we have to call a licensed plumber or trained mechanic, and nobody would recommend attempting your own heart surgery! A broken relationship with God is something else we can't repair on our own. Plenty of religions and philosophies suggest we can, but their methods are ineffective and hopeless. The truth is that there is only One who can fix our sin problem.

Because God is just, it is necessary that there is a payment for sin—it's impossible that He would simply let it go—and the price for our sin is eternal judgment in hell. Thankfully, through His death on the cross, Jesus paid the price. And because Jesus is righteous, death could not hold Him and He rose from the grave. When we place our trust in Jesus, living by faith in obedience to God, we will be forgiven of sin and live eternally with God.

> CHRIST

Jesus' death was the sacrifice that paid for the sins of the world. In view of what Jesus has done for you, give thanks!

Write a brief prayer offering thanks to Jesus for dying on the cross that you could be forgiven of your sins and reconciled to God.



>COMMUNITY

Our sin meant that we were enemies of God. However, even when we were rebellious and disobedient, Jesus died that we would be forgiven.

Offer forgiveness—chances are there is someone in your life who has hurt or offended you. Maybe it's even someone in your family or in the church. Since God has forgiven us, it's important that we forgive others. Reach out to the person who has wronged you and share that you're willing to forgive them and that you'd like to see your relationship restored.

> CULTURE

The forgiveness and salvation Jesus provided through His death is available to all. But for us to receive it, we must first acknowledge that we've sinned.

This week, have a conversation with a non-believing friend about these things.

- > Share that you've sinned and fallen short of God's standards, but because of Jesus' sacrifice, you've been forgiven.
- > Ask if they'd like to trust Jesus for forgiveness and salvation.

Day One **ROMANS 6:5**

Leading up to this passage in Romans 6, Paul has addressed the importance of our being baptized into Christ. Water baptism is of essential importance—perhaps more important than many of us understand. But this passage isn't speaking directly to water baptism. Baptism refers specifically to our identifying so deeply with something or someone that our life is now defined according to that identification. For instance (and get ready because this is going to be a bit silly, but true), if my wife picks me up from the library, I'm in a sense baptized into her van. By opening the door and sitting in the passenger seat, the next 15 minutes of my life are defined by the van and my wife's driving it. I go where it goes. I see only through its windows. "If" (and that's big) we are baptized into Jesus, it's because the old selfish person has died and a new spiritual person has been raised. Being baptized into Christ involves our identifying with Him to the point that we go where He goes, we see as He sees, and we live as He does.

What is the significance of baptism?

How does your life prove that you've identified with Jesus?

Day Two **ROMANS 6:6-7**



When we imagine an old man or old lady (and I mean ancient), what comes to mind is a person who's frail and hunched over, whose hair is gray and whose face is marked by deep wrinkles, and who lacks energy and strength. When Paul talks about the "old self," he's speaking essentially of the same idea, except on a spiritual level. The old self refers to the spirit that is worn out and on the verge of death. Because of the curse, the natural self is powerless to do anything about our sin. Surrendering to Jesus involves the death of the old, useless self. Thankfully, when we die to sin, it no longer has a claim against us.

How is an unsaved person like an old man or woman?

Why does sin have no claim against a saved person?

Day Three **ROMANS 6:8-9**

Here's that word again—if. Dying with Christ means a couple specific things:

- > We no longer depend on the old self, which is powerless to do anything about our sin issue, to earn God's favor.
- > We no longer live selfishly in ways that we want and in opposition to God.

If we've died with Christ, then and only then can we be confident that we will experience new life in Him. The Bible contains stories of several people (other than Jesus) being raised from the dead. Perhaps Lazarus is the most familiar. However, we don't identify with Lazarus in his death and resurrection. Here's why. Though Lazarus was raised, he still died again—physically speaking, at least. But Jesus, after he was raised, never again experienced death, and "if" we identify with Jesus, we can know confidently that we will never taste the ultimate consequence of our sin. Sin and death have no claim on us. This is evident in our living in obedience to Jesus every day in the here and now, and this will be perfectly evident through the eternal life we enjoy in Jesus' eternal kingdom.

- How can we know we've died with Christ?
- How is our being raised with Jesus evident in our lives?

Day Four ROMANS 6:10

That Jesus died to sin is a once-and-for-all reality that has powerful implications for our lives. Though Jesus, because He took on our flesh along with its weaknesses, was subject to temptation, He did not and could not sin. When Jesus died on the cross bearing the penalty for our sin, it was a one-time reality. Jesus' death was to destroy sin, and His life—every choice, every word, every interaction, every desire—was to glorify God. If we identify with Jesus in His death on the cross, we can know for certain that death no longer has a claim on our lives. In turn, we are called to live with everything we are for God's glory.

> Why did Jesus die?

What does it mean that He died "once for all time"?

Day Five ROMANS 6:11



From the point of coming to faith in Jesus, our lives are defined by being dead to sin and being alive in Jesus. This affects not only the ways we see ourselves, but also the ways we live every day. We no longer live selfishly and in ways that are evidence of sin in our lives, but in ways that show we love Jesus. If we expect to live with Christ for eternity in heaven, then we must not live according to the flesh—after all, we are dead to sin. Instead, we must live in ways every day that show we are alive in Jesus.

> What defines the life of a Christian?

The POINT >

New life is possible when we trust in the risen Christ.

> JOHN 20:3-9,19-23,27-29

³ At that, Peter and the other disciple went out, heading for the tomb. ⁴ The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and got to the tomb first. ⁵ Stooping down, he saw the linen cloths lying there, but he did not go in. ⁶ Then, following him, Simon Peter also came. because they feared the Jews. Jesus came, stood among them, and said to them, "Peace be with you." ²⁰ Having said this, he showed them his hands and his side. So the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹ Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, I also send you." ²² After saying this, he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³ If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

²⁷Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and look at my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Don't be faithless, but believe." ²⁸ Thomas responded to him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹ Jesus said, "Because you have seen me, you have believed. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe."

Even with amazing phones, we still aren't good listeners. On average, people can only listen to about 100 words per minute. But we think faster than we hear, and our brains can process thoughts at about 3000 words per minute.1

The idea that people could communicate without being in the same room seemed impossible until Samuel Morse showed what a telegraph could do in 1837. The idea that voices, not just dots and dashes, could be transmitted seemed impossible until Reginald Fessenden did it in 1901.

We could go on and on about how people have taken inventions and innovations to the next seemingly impossible level. Today we use smartphones—tiny computers that fit in our hands and give us instant access to near-endless amounts of data.

While we might marvel at science and the amazing things once considered impossible, one thing remains impossible for us—to raise a man to life who has been dead for days after enduring an agonizing execution, horrific wounds, and extreme loss of blood. But what is impossible for us is not impossible for God. God performed this "impossible" miracle and gave us something far greater than even the most advanced technology!

He did these things as signs of who He truly is and to help people overcome our struggles to believe. When we confess that Jesus is Lord and believe in our hearts that God raised Him from the dead, our sins will be forgiven and we will be given new eternal life in Christ (Rom. 10:9-10).

> CHRIST

The Christian faith depends on the reality of Jesus' resurrection. There is no salvation without Jesus' dying on the cross and rising from the dead.

When have you, like Thomas, had doubts about the resurrection of Jesus? How have you dealt with doubts regarding your faith? Do you still need to deal with these doubts?

Write an honest prayer to God expressing struggles you may have with your faith. Ask God to reveal clearly to you the truth about Jesus (much like Jesus did for Thomas) and to help you trust fully in Him.

>COMMUNITY



Day One **JOHN 11:17-19**

The Jewish tradition was to bury on the day a person died. That Lazarus was in the tomb for four days indicates that he'd been dead that same length of time. When Jesus received the message of Lazarus's illness, He didn't immediately rush to heal him, but instead waited two days before making the journey to see His friends (v. 6). By the time Jesus arrived, Lazarus's body had begun to decompose, and whereas, Jesus had previously raised others from the dead (Luke 7:11-17; 8:49-56), this was a whole different situation. Because of the length of time Lazarus had been dead, there was no possibility in the minds of the Jews of his being raised to life. This is the reason Jesus waited so long to return to His friends (v. 4).

Why did the situation seem so hopeless?

When have you faced a situation that seemed hopeless to you?

Day Two **JOHN 11:20**



In Luke 10:38-42, we are given a picture of Mary and Martha's personalities. Mary was relational and laid back. Martha, on the other hand, liked to stay busy, continually working to make sure that everything that needed to be done actually got done. True to form, when Martha heard Jesus was coming, she had some things she wanted to say to Him—after all, she was known to speak her mind (Luke 10:40)—so she stepped away from the crowd who had gathered to mourn to speak to Jesus in private. The perspectives she would share weren't necessarily grounded in faith. Nonetheless, she spoke honestly from her heart, and inasmuch as she was willing to listen humbly to Jesus' reply, this was a great way to approach the situation.

- When have you been hesitant to share how you really feel with God?
- > Why is it important that we share our hearts and not simply try to say all the right things when we engage with God?

Day Three JOHN 11:21-22

When Mary and Martha found out that their brother was seriously ill, one of the first things to come to their minds was probably to ask Jesus to come help. They knew of Jesus' power. Plus, they had a close relationship with Him. If He was going to heal anyone, they must have thought it would be the people He loved. But Jesus didn't make it in time. Further. Lazarus had been dead for four days with his body already decomposing before Jesus showed up. In one sense, Martha's words to Jesus were a complaint. However, it was also an expression of her faith. She truly did believe that if Jesus had been there. He could have healed her brother. But now, it was simply too late. Still, Martha believed that Jesus, because of His special connection with God, could ask and that the Father could bring something good of the situation. Her perspective was, in a certain sense, healthy. Still, she couldn't have imagined what she would witness in the coming moments.

- When have you needed Jesus to show up in your life?
- Do you truly believe that Jesus can accomplish things that might seem to be impossible? How does your life show this?

Day Four **JOHN 11:23-24**

Martha had shared her thoughts with Jesus, and in response, Jesus shared that Lazarus would rise again. However, Jesus and Martha simply weren't on the same wavelength.

Martha said, "Yeah, I know that—he'll rise again in the resurrection at the last day." At least some of the Jews believed that at the end of this age, God's people would be raised from the dead, and this was Martha's perspective.

Certainly, there was some hope and comfort in this belief. But this wasn't what Martha wanted in this moment. She wanted her brother to be alive in the here-and-now, but it was too late.

At least that's what she thought.

> When have you come to realize that what Jesus (or the Bible) said was different from what you originally thought?

Why is it so important that we know not only what the Bible says, but that we also understand the meaning?

Day Five **JOHN 11:25-26**



When Jesus made this statement—"I am the resurrection and the life"—He used very specific language that was unmistakable to the Jews. When Moses asked God His name, the Lord responded, "I AM WHO I AM" (Ex. 3:14). In claiming "I am," Jesus used the very language that God used when revealing Himself to Moses. Jesus was making the statement that, not only is there a resurrection on the last day, but "I Am" that resurrection. And not only on the last day, but at all times, including today. For those who trust Jesus, the resurrection is a reality every day. We are freed from sin's consequences—ultimately death—and we are raised to live a new life in Christ, Lazarus was living proof of this reality, and when we live for Jesus, we are too.

> JOHN 15:26-27; 16:7-15

²⁶ "When the Counselor comes, the one I will send to you from the Father—the Spirit of truth who proceeds from the Father—he will testify about me. 27 You also will testify, because you have been with me from the beginning.

Nevertheless, I am telling you the truth. It is for your benefit that I go away, because if I don't go away the Counselor will not come to you. If I go, I will send him to you. 8 When he comes, he will convict the world about sin, righteousness, and judgment: ⁹ About sin, because they do not believe in me; ¹⁰ about

righteousness, because I am going to the Father and you

will no longer see me; 11 and about judgment, because the ruler of this world has been judged. 12 "I still have many things to tell you, but you can't bear them now. 13 When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth. For he will not speak on his own, but he will speak whatever he hears. He will also declare to you what is to come. ¹⁴ He will glorify me, because he will take from what is mine and declare it to you. ¹⁵ Everything the Father has is mine. This is why I told you that he takes from what is mine and will declare it to you.



Jesus said it was better that He went away, because in His place, the Holy Spirit would come to minister to God's people, and while Jesus was only one place at one time while on earth, the Spirit would be present with all God's people no matter where we are. One way the Holy Spirit ministers to us is that He helps us to understand the things Jesus said, including inspiring the exact words the authors of Scripture wrote down, as well as helping us today to know how these words apply to our lives.

> CHRIST

The Bible speaks over and over about the Holy Spirit as the Spirit of Christ. (See Rom. 8:9; 1 Pet. 1:11; Gal. 4:6.) We have a relationship with Jesus through the Holy Spirit's ministry to us. This involves our living not by the flesh, but by the Spirit.

Read Galatians 5:16-25. Make a list of the "works of the flesh" and the "fruit of the Spirit."

Beside each item on the list, make a brief note about how each one describes you. Is your life characterized more by living in the flesh or the Spirit? How will you commit to growing?

>COMMUNITY

The church body is the temple in which the Holy Spirit dwells today (1 Cor. 6:19-20). We are called to devote ourselves, not only as individuals, but also corporately to worshiping God. When we sin, we bring harm not only to ourselves but to the church.

Day One **ACTS 1:4**

After His death and resurrection, Jesus appeared to His disciples over a period of several weeks. During this time, He helped them to believe in the resurrection by offering proof of what had happened, and He continued to teach them about the kingdom of God. Only moments before Jesus would ascend to heaven, He reminded them of the importance of the Holy Spirit's ministry in their lives. In John 16:6-11, we read of Jesus' sharing with His disciples that it was better that He left. With Jesus' being gone, the Spirit would come and minister to God's people in a way that was different from Jesus' ministry. Jesus, as a man, was only one place at a time, and the number of people He served was limited by their being where He was. With the Spirit, however, these limitations don't apply. He is able to serve anyone, anywhere. God had promised to send the Spirit, and on multiple occasions, Jesus had reminded His disciples of this promise. This promise would soon be fulfilled.

Why did Jesus say it was better that He leave so the Spirit would come?

Why was the Spirit so important in the lives of the disciples?

Day Two **ACTS 1:5**



John preached a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins (Mark 1:4). Though the Bible doesn't mention the apostles' being baptized, Jesus (as well as other New Testament authors) clearly teach the importance of baptism in identifying with Jesus. To demonstrate that they were followers of Christ, it's safe to assume the disciples had been baptized. Now Jesus taught them that though water baptism was important, it wasn't the whole story. Whereas their bodies had been immersed in water, it was even more important that their spirits be immersed in the Holy Spirit Himself. Through water baptism, we make the one-time declaration that we identify with Jesus in His death and resurrection. In turn, it is our being baptized with the Spirit that allows us to live out this declaration every day.

- Why is water baptism so important?

Day Three **ACTS 1:6**

In Ezekiel 36 and Joel 2 (these are Old Testament prophecies), God had not only promised to restore His people, but He also promised to pour out His Spirit. As faithful Jews, the apostles were familiar with these prophecies, and they connected the coming of the Spirit with the Messiah's re-establishing Israel as a powerful, earthly kingdom. Since they believed that Jesus was the Messiah (and they were right), they thought He would now establish God's kingdom on earth. Their Messiah had died, and they were crushed. But He had been raised from the dead, and their hope was restored. Now, Jesus was speaking about the specific event—the coming of the Spirit—that was connected with God's kingdom being established. With all they had been through, it was finally time that all they'd dreamed of would be made a reality—the kingdom of Israel would be restored! At least, that's what they thought.

When have you misunderstood what God actually intended through His Word?

How would you describe the kingdom of God?

Day Four **ACTS 1:7**

The disciples had all kinds of questions, and they naturally wanted answers. Specifically, they wanted to know the timing of God's kingdom being restored to Israel. Jesus didn't address the nature of the kingdom—only the timing. And what He said was essentially that they didn't need to worry about these things. God is in control of all the details. Our responsibility is simply to trust that He is in control and to live in obedience to the specific things to which He has called each of us. This is not to say we shouldn't seek answers to our guestions—we should. However, we must also accept that God's ways and thoughts are higher than ours, and we can never fully grasp His nature or purposes. We should seek every day to know God as deeply and intimately as possible, and in areas we just don't understand, we should simply trust and live in obedience.



Day Five **ACTS 1:8**



The prophecies in Ezekiel 36 and Joel 2, on one level, apply to God's Spirit being poured out and God's kingdom being established. However, this applied more directly to the apostles in an eternal sense—the Spirit would come upon them that, through their sharing the gospel, people would be brought into God's eternal kingdom. The Holy Spirit would empower them to spread the gospel throughout the world and lay the foundations of the church. Through sharing their testimonies—the things they had seen and heard from Jesus—God would use the apostles to impact the lives of many they encountered. Today, followers of Jesus have the same Spirit in our lives, and God wants to use us for the same purposes as the apostles. By the power of the Spirit, we are called to testify about Jesus, pointing others to the hope found only in Him.

the stars will fall from the sky, and the powers of the heavens will be shaken. 30 Then the sign of the Son of Man will appear in the sky, and then all the peoples of the earth will mourn; and they will see the Son of Man coming on the clouds of heaven with power and great glory. 31 He will send out his angels with a loud trumpet, and they will gather his elect from the four winds, from one end of the sky to the other. 32 "Learn this lesson from the fig tree: As soon as its branch becomes tender and sprouts leaves, you know that summer is near.

⁴²Therefore be alert, since you don't know what day your Lord is coming. 43 But know this: If the homeowner had known what time the thief was coming, he would have stayed alert and not let his house be broken into. 44 This is why you are also to be ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.



LEVELS OF BIBLICAL LEARNING // JESUS

The Bible teaches that Jesus will one day return for His people and exercise His reign over all creation. Because we don't know when this will happen, we need to live continually with the awareness that Jesus could return at any moment. Because of our deep love for Jesus, because we want to be with Him, and because we desire His restoring all that sin has broken, we should long for Jesus' return.

> CHRIST

We are to live every moment in anticipation of Jesus' return. This is a strong motivation to make sure we live lives of purity.

Day One

1 THESSALONIANS 5:1-2

In Acts 1, when Jesus told His disciples about the coming of the Spirit, they tied the Spirit's coming with Jesus' establishing His kingdom on earth. So they asked Jesus if this was the case, and He responded, "It is not for you to know times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority" (Acts 1:7). Still, many of Jesus' followers expected Him to come again in their lifetime, and when many died without Jesus' returning, some began to grow impatient or confused and may even have struggled with their faith. Paul reminded the church of the same thing Jesus had said—it's not our place to know the times and the seasons. In fact, they already knew that the day of the Lord will come when we least expect it. Because of this, we need to live every day, every moment, with Jesus' return in mind. When He comes, we don't want to be caught living disobediently. We want to be found faithful, working to carry out Jesus' mission.

Why is it so important to live in light of **Tesus' return?**

Day Two

1 THESSALONIANS 5:3-4



When we go to sleep at night, most people make sure to lock their doors. However, some people live in communities where they feel so safe that they feel no need to lock up. However, should a thief come along one night, an unlocked home would be especially vulnerable. The people who say "peace and security" are like a naive homeowner, except they're dealing with issues of eternity. They live as if Jesus will never return, and there will be consequences for their lack of concern. For those who give no thought to these matters, one day they will be caught off guard, and they will suffer for their lack of attention to Jesus' return. Christians, however, know better, and we should live every day knowing that Jesus could come at any moment.

- Are you sometimes tempted to become so comfortable that you forget to live as if Jesus is coming back? Why or why not?
- How would you describe what it means to live in light of Jesus' return?

Day Three 1 THESSALONIANS 5:5

Light and dark, in Scripture, refers to living in ways that are worthy of being seen by others and by God—versus living in ways that are shameful, that are done at night and in the dark, and deserve to be hidden. For those who have followed Jesus in faith, we no longer live in the dark—in ways that would bring shame to the name of Jesus. Instead, we are children of light, and we live, just as Jesus did, in righteousness and in ways that bring honor to the Lord. Notice, the apostle Paul did not say, "If you're a Christian, you should live in ways that aren't shameful." It's not about doing—it's a matter of being. He said, "You are all children of light" [emphasis mine]. For true followers of Jesus, the overwhelming pattern of our lives will be living in ways that honor Jesus.

Day Four 1 THESSALONIANS 5:6-8

Many people (especially teens) enjoy sleeping late. Lying around lazily communicates in a certain sense that there's nothing else we need to do in the moment—that there are no urgent needs in our lives. Paul shares with the church that although one day we will enter into eternal rest (and even now, we can rest in Jesus), now is not the time to "sleep" in the spiritual sense. This refers to spiritual laziness or a general lack of concern about the things going on in the world. Though physical darkness may send a message that it's time for our bodies to rest, and the night tempts some to engage in all kinds of unhealthy behaviors, Christians should never let spiritual darkness tempt us to be lazy, or worse. Instead, in a dark world, we must remain alert and intentionally devoted to the pursuit of holy living.

How do you see spiritual darkness affecting worldly people?

When are you tempted to be lazy about spiritual things?

Day Five

1 THESSALONIANS 5:9-11



It is natural for people to have a certain level of fear or apprehension about death. After all, there are details that we simply don't understand, and it's certainly true that no one in this life has experienced firsthand what lies on the other side. However, Paul offers this encouragement whether we're "awake or asleep" (that's alive or dead), we can know that those who belong to Jesus will live together with Him. Sin will be judged, and those who have rejected Christ will not be spared from the wrath of God. For those who have believed, however, Jesus will one day return and take us to heaven where we will dwell for eternity. Life is difficult and this world is dark. Let's make sure to continually remind our brothers and sisters of Jesus' return and the future that awaits God's people.

¹⁶ From now on, then, we do not know anyone from a worldly perspective. Even if we have known Christ from a worldly perspective, yet now we no longer know him in this way. ¹⁷ Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he

is a new creation; the old has passed away, and see, the new has come! 18 Everything is from God, who has reconciled us to himself through Christ and has given us the ministry of reconciliation. ¹⁹ That is, in Christ, God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and he has committed the message of reconciliation to us.

²⁰ Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us. We plead on Christ's behalf. "Be reconciled to God." 21 He made the one who did not know sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

LEVELS OF BIBLICAL LEARNING // **PEOPLE**

We live in a society where people sue others for all kinds of things, and it happens that my mom is an attorney. When someone (a plaintiff) seeks legal action against someone else (a defendant), a formal document must be delivered to the defendant informing them of their requirement to be in court. To make a little extra money in college, I would work for my mom as a process server, which meant I delivered the letters.

It wasn't always easy, and sometimes, it was downright dangerous, depending on how people responded to the bad news I delivered. However, it was important for both parties that this news be delivered.

The message we are called to deliver to the world is much more important than a subpoena to be in court. God expects His followers to carry the message of Jesus to the world. Though it can be challenging and the news may not always be well received, it's vital to provide an opportunity for others to respond to a life or death situation. We also need to remember that we're not sharing bad news—the message of Jesus is good news!



Day One **LUKE 24:44-45**

Throughout Jesus' ministry, He spent time with His followers teaching them and allowing them to observe the ways He lived. However, the disciples were slow in understanding the things Jesus shared with them. They saw things from their own—and sometimes very narrow perspectives, and they often missed the point of Jesus' words. However, after Jesus' resurrection. this would begin to change. As Jesus' followers heard His teachings about the Old Testament Scriptures, they began to understand it in ways they hadn't before. It could have been because their faith had been powerfully impacted by their seeing the resurrected Jesus. It could have been that Jesus supernaturally opened their eyes to see the truth. Either way, Jesus began a process that would be carried on by the Holy Spirit—Jesus helped His followers to understand that He is the perfect fulfillment of the law and the prophets, and that He alone is worthy of our worship.

Why do we need the Spirit to open our minds to the truth of Scripture?

How is Jesus the fulfillment of all the Old Testament?

Day Two **LUKE 24:46**



In helping His disciples to understand that He is the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy, Jesus outlined the main points of the gospel. First, He addressed the crucifixion and resurrection. In fulfilling the promises of God, Jesus suffered and died on the cross as the payment for our sins. But because He held power over sin and death, the grave couldn't hold Him, and Jesus rose from the dead on the third day. It was of essential importance that the disciples understand clearly the truth of Jesus' death and resurrection to fulfill the mission to which Jesus would soon call them.

Why was it necessary that Jesus died?

Why was it so important that the disciples understand the crucifixion and resurrection?

Day Three **LUKE 24:47**

In Mark 1, we read that John preached a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins (v. 4). Jesus preached the same message—that repenting from sin and believing the truth of the gospel was necessary for forgiveness and being brought into God's kingdom (Mark 1:14). Before Jesus left the earth, this same good news was entrusted to His followers. Jesus told His disciples that repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be proclaimed in his name to all the nations. If people would turn in faith to Jesus, they would experience God's forgiveness in their lives. Jesus' disciples were commissioned to declare this message to all people. Today, we've been called to this same mission.

Day Four **LUKE 24:48**

For generations, the Old Testament had pointed forward to the Messiah and the ways He would make it possible for God's people to experience forgiveness and restoration. Jesus helped His followers to see how He'd fulfilled the prophecies, then He pointed out that they had actually witnessed the prophecies' being fulfilled. A witness is specifically someone who sees an event take place. This would be an important reality with the gospel's spreading to the nations. God would use the witness of Jesus' followers—their actually seeing Jesus' power, most clearly expressed through the resurrection—in helping people come to faith in Christ. If you're a follower of a Christ, you've witnessed firsthand the power of Jesus in your life. We are called to tell others about the ways Jesus has impacted us. When we do, others will be drawn to Christ

Why is an eyewitness account so powerful?

Day Five LUKE 24:49



At times, the thought of sharing our testimony or sharing the gospel with a non-believer can be intimidating. However, Jesus promised that we won't be alone when we do. God had promised to send His Holy Spirit to empower His people to carry out the mission, and Jesus told them that the Spirit would come very soon. In fact, approximately a week after this conversation, the Spirit would come upon the disciples in power. When this happened, they began to testify about Jesus and many came to faith. The same Spirit is in our lives today, and when we will boldly proclaim the message of the gospel—just as Jesus called us to do through the Great Commission—He will use us to draw people to Himself.

Since coming to faith in Christ as a junior in high school, my prayer life has gone through many high, as well as low, points. Early on, I had plenty of time to pray—or maybe it's more accurate to say that I "made" more time to pray. I often met with friends before school to pray, and we got together every Thursday evening to study the Bible and pray. On weekends, we would go to the local mall or other places around town to share the gospel, and we would always pray before and after.

However, over time, life got busier. College, work, and family have all brought more and more responsibility, and though I've remained committed to prayer, busyness sometimes keeps me from praying as I should. My struggle is never a lack of desire, but a matter of prioritizing the things that are truly important. I've learned over the years that, if I want a healthy prayer life, I have to be very intentional with my prayer time.

I'm not alone. Many people struggle with prayer. When we see obvious, physical needs others may have, we know what to pray. However, prayer is much more than these things. We should also pray for the spiritual needs of others, including their salvation. And ultimately, we should pray in order to remain relationally connected with God.



Day One **MATTHEW 9:35a**

When Jesus began His earthly ministry, He consistently traveled from town to town, sharing the gospel with as many as would listen. The synagogue was the place where Jews gathered week to week to study God's Word, and it was a common practice that visiting Jewish rabbis had the opportunity to stand before the gathered people to share their perspectives on the Scriptures. Jesus had the reputation as a well respected rabbi (see Mark 9:5; 14:45; John 1:38; 20:16), so when He visited the synagogues in Israel, He stepped into ready-made opportunities to share the gospel with those in attendance. The message Jesus shared and the authority with which He shared it were unlike anything the people had ever encountered and contained the power to transform lives.

Why was it so important that Jesus traveled from town to town?

How would you describe God's role in creating this arrangement that allowed for Jesus' teaching throughout Israel?

Day Two **MATTHEW 9:35b**



People from all around came to see Jesus.
Undoubtedly, many who were sick had tried everything they knew to find healing, yet found no answers. However, they were hearing stories of a man named Jesus who was able to heal issues that had confounded all others. As important as healing the sick was in Jesus' ministry, this wasn't His purpose. Jesus also preached the gospel to those He encountered—this was His purpose (Mark 1:38). The healings provided temporary relief from sin's effects. Only the gospel, however, provided the answer for sin's ultimate consequence.

Day Three **MATTHEW 9:36**

As much as the people's physical suffering grieved Jesus, the compassion He felt most deeply was due to their being like sheep without a shepherd. Sheep are essentially helpless animals, and without the guidance of a good shepherd, they are doomed. They'll wander aimlessly, eventually starving or injuring themselves. With no defensive weapons, they can become easy targets for predators. The people faced all kinds of practical, physical needs. However, the desperate state of their spiritual condition was a far greater need. Israel's spiritual leaders didn't know God or understand His Word, and they'd failed to shepherd God's people. The leaders were selfish and prideful, and the people were suffering spiritually. Jesus, in expressing His humanity, felt great compassion concerning the people's pain, and He would minister to them in profoundly meaningful ways.

How would you describe the compassion Jesus felt for the people of Israel?

Day Four **MATTHEW 9:37**

At a specific time, a farmer must go into his fields and collect all the grain. Otherwise, it will be lost. In fact, a large team of workers must be hired in order to harvest all the grain within a healthy time frame on larger farms. As Jesus looked out over all the people who were coming to Him, He understood that their souls would be lost if they were brought to God. Jesus felt a sense of urgency that these people would hear the gospel—the means by which the people would be saved. However, He also knew that there was a desperate shortage of faithful teachers who would proclaim the truth of God's message. Jesus' answer was to invite all His followers—including Christians today to join in His mission of harvesting souls for the kingdom.

What did Jesus mean that "the harvest is abundant"?



Day Five **MATTHEW 9:38**



Jesus' followers are called to join Jesus in His mission of proclaiming the gospel to all people. We do this by testifying about Jesus' transforming power in our lives, as well as through sharing the gospel. We also engage in Jesus' mission through our prayers. In verse 38, Jesus called His disciples to pray specifically that more workers would join in the mission of reaching the lost. Today, there is a shortage of people committed to sharing the hope of Jesus with the hopeless people all around us. We need to understand that our prayers make a difference, and if we pray for more workers, God will answer. Let's get busy sharing the gospel, and let's pray that God would surround us with others committed to doing the same.

> ROMANS 10:8b-17

8... The message is near you, in your mouth and in your heart. This is the message of faith that we proclaim: 9 If you confess with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. 10 One believes with the heart, resulting in righteousness, and one confesses with the mouth, resulting in salvation. 11 For the Scripture says, Everyone who believes on him will not be put to shame, 12 since there is no distinction between Jew and Greek, because the same Lord of all richly blesses all who call on him. 13 For everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.

¹⁴ How, then, can they call on him they have not believed in? And how can they believe without hearing about him? For Isaiah says, Lord, who has believed our message? ¹⁷ So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes through the message about Christ.

Developing relationships and friendships online has become commonplace, whether through social media, video game communities, or even dating apps. However, it is common for people to portray themselves online in ways that don't align with who they really are. A recent TV series investigated these online-only relationships, and when online "friends" refused to move forward with in-person meetings, suspicions arose that the person was pretending to be someone they were not. The show's investigators then sought to discover the truth, and over and over, when the truth was uncovered, people were heartbroken or humiliated to find out they'd been deceived. This series reveals some people's desperate need to trust someone who will value and honor them.

Trust is a major issue in our society, and our culture is severely lacking in truth and trust. Fortunately, there's an answer—His name is Jesus. A relationship with Him provides the promise of an eternal future with the One who is the truth and can always be trusted.

Day One MARK 1:14a

John was a prophet whom God had sent to prepare the way for Jesus' ministry. He was bold not only in proclaiming the truth of Scripture, but also in "proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins" (Mark 1:4). John was continually calling people to repent of their sins so they could experience God's forgiveness, and he didn't discriminate. Herod Antipas, who ruled over Galilee (the region where John ministered), was living in an incestuous relationship with his niece, and John pointed out his sin. Ultimately, John would be killed for his commitment to telling the truth. We, too, may face rejection for speaking the truth. Still, it is the right thing to do. God used John in powerful ways, and as long as we speak the truth with boldness, patience, and kindness, God will use us too.

Why was John so bold, even when speaking the truth would lead to his arrest and death?

How is God calling you to be more bold in sharing the gospel?

Day Two MARK 1:14b



When Jesus began His public ministry, He traveled from town to town throughout Galilee, the northern rural region of Israel, proclaiming the gospel to anyone who would listen. Jesus became known for supernaturally healing the sick, and people from all around would flock to Him to be healed from their diseases. He would also—and perhaps more importantly—preach the gospel to all who would listen. In fact, sharing the gospel was central to His mission for in this message is the power to transform lives—not only in the here-and-now, but for eternity. The good news that Jesus preached is the same message we're called to share today. In fact, just as the gospel was central to Jesus' mission, it's also central to ours. As followers of Christ, we are called to proclaim the good news of God to the people in our lives.

- In your own words, what is the good news of God?
- Why was sharing the good news central to Jesus' mission?

Day Three MARK 1:15a

In Genesis 15, we read of God's establishing a covenant with Abraham. God had promised to give Abraham and his offspring a land where they would experience God's blessing (Gen. 13:15). However, God wouldn't give it over to them immediately. At that time, the land was occupied by other nations, and God saw that "the iniquity of the Amorites has not yet reached its full measure" (Gen. 15:16). Regarding even pagan people, God was patient and allowed them the opportunity to repent before judging them. When Jesus said, "the time is fulfilled," this was the same language as the Amorites' sin being "full" or "complete." Jesus was saying to the Jewish people, God has been patient with you, but His patience has run out and your rebellion is now full. God had sent Jesus to separate the faithful from the rebellious. God's grace would be poured out on those who would repent from their sins. However, for those who rejected Jesus, God would no longer be patient and merciful.

- Why do you think God was so patient with the Amorites and other pagan nations?
- Why is it dangerous to test God's patience?

Day Four MARK 1:15b

For generations, the Jewish people had been looking for the Messiah—an anointed king who would free Israel from oppression and restore the nation to a position of prominence among the nations of the world. The prophets had foretold the Messiah's coming. However, the Jews interpreted the messages according to their own desires and perspectives. When Jesus came to earth. He didn't establish the kind of kingdom the people were expecting, for God's kingdom isn't first an earthly kingdom, but a spiritual one. God's kingdom exists where people live under the rule of Jesus. In proclaiming the gospel, Jesus was telling people that He had come to establish God's heavenly kingdom as a reality on earth.

How would you describe the kingdom of God?

How does your life show that you live in submission to the rule of Christ?

Day Five MARK 1:15c



Though we are all sinners and God will only be patient for so long, those who are willing to turn from their sin and trust in Jesus can be part of God's kingdom forever. This is the good news Jesus brought to the world. In fact, there is no better news! This applied not only to the people in Jesus' time—it applies to us today. Forgiveness of sin and salvation from death is available to anyone who chooses to repent and believe. We are called to live this way. Further, it's the responsibility of all Jesus' followers to share this good news with the people in our lives.

What is true repentance? Belief?

What practical steps will you take to share this good news with the people in your life who may not follow Christ?



> COLOSSIANS 3:1-3,12-17

¹So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. ² Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things. 3 For you died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God.

¹²Therefore, as God's chosen ones, holy and dearly loved, put on compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, 13 bearing with one another and forgiving one another if anyone has a grievance against another. Just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you are also to forgive. ¹⁴ Above all, put on love, which is the perfect bond of unity. 15 And let the peace of

Christ, to which you were also called in one body, rule your hearts. Day One 1 JOHN 3:13

Jesus shared with His disciples that if we live as the world lives, then it will love us as its own (John 15:19). However, the world hated Jesus, and because we live as He did, the world will hate us too. We live in a world that has been broken by sin. In fact, the world is so warped that people are inclined toward seeing what is evil as good, and in turn, they see what is good as evil (Isa. 5:20). Many are tempted to believe that when we surrender our lives to Jesus, our lives will automatically become easy. This isn't the case. According to what Jesus taught, we should expect quite the opposite—we'll be rejected, even persecuted, for following Jesus. However, it is all worth it as we are made more like Christ. and through the faith that leads us to live well through suffering, we are given the gift of God's grace leading to eternal life.

Why does the world hate followers of Jesus?

How would you describe "hate" in this verse?

Day Two 1 JOHN 3:14-15



Jesus taught that the greatest commandments are that His followers love God above all else. and that we love others as much as we love ourselves. In fact, loving others is so important in the lives of Jesus' followers that we can know that we have eternal life (or not) by the presence of love in our lives. If there's a lack of love—not just the way we feel, but in the way we treat others—then we have reason to question God's transforming work in our lives. However, when we live (and love) like Jesus, we can have confidence that our hearts have been changed, and we will live eternally with God.

Why is love an essential part of following Jesus?

Based on the ways you live, do you have confidence you have eternal life?

Day Three 1 JOHN 3:16

At times, we may be tempted to compare ourselves to others and to see ourselves as good people. However, the standard God has set for His people isn't based on those we encounter from day to day. The standard is Jesus. And the way He demonstrated His love for us is that He laid down His life for sinners. Jesus' love was certainly expressed in His sacrifice on the cross, but this wasn't the only way. Jesus lived every moment of every day as an expression of God's love for people. It wasn't a single act of dying for those He loved—Jesus chose every day to give up any and all selfish desires in order to sacrificially show love to the people who desperately needed it. Jesus lived and died as a clear picture of the love of God, and we are called to live this same way. In fact, this is the mark of a true follower of Jesus.

How specifically did Jesus live as an expression of God's love?

What are practical ways we can "lay down our lives" for others?

Day Four **1 JOHN 3:17**

James asks, "What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone claims to have faith but does not have works?" (Jas. 2:14), and claims that "faith" that doesn't lead to meeting others' needs in real ways is a false faith. If someone is hungry and we pray for them and genuinely desire to see them fed, but we don't share our own food, then we have legitimate heart issues. If someone is cold and we desperately want to see them obtain a coat and shelter, but we don't share from our own closets or invite them to stay in our home, we need to examine our hearts. Here's the issue—if we see people in need, but we withhold real-world expressions of love and compassion, then we need to ask ourselves, "Is God's love really in my heart?" John's perspective here is that when the love of God has transformed a person's heart that love will be expressed. Every time. Without question.

Day Five 1 JOHN 3:18



We all know that talk is cheap. Many people like to talk a big game, but fail to back it up in the ways they live. This certainly applies to many Christians today, and this is why one of the biggest complaints against Christians is acting as hypocrites. A hypocrite is a person who acts (or claims) to be something which they don't live out. As Christians, we are to be known not only by what we say—and we are to speak the truth and share the gospel continually—but also in the ways we live, backing up our claims by showing real love to everyone in our lives. This is the defining characteristic of a true follower of Christ. Jesus loved in real ways, and in following Him, we will love others too.

When have you failed to back up your words in the way you live?

> ACTS 17:16-18,22-23,30-31

¹⁶While Paul was waiting for them in Athens, he was deeply distressed when he saw that the city was full of idols. To he reasoned in the synagogue with the Jews and with those who worshiped God, as well as in the marketplace every day with those who happened to be there. 18 Some of the Epicurean and Stoic philosophers also debated with him. Some said, "What is this ignorant show-off trying to say?" Others replied, "He seems to be a preacher of foreign deities"—because he was telling the good news about Jesus and the resurrection.

²² Paul stood in the middle of the Areopagus and said, "People of Athens! When I was in college, I would always keep a small New Testament Bible in my bag or in my pocket. During breaks between classes, I would often sit down on a bench or on the lawn outside the music building to read Scripture. One day, a fellow music student with whom I was acquainted, but didn't know well, sat down next to me and struck up a conversation. I quickly answered, then got back to reading. When my friend interrupted me again, I became a little annoyed until I realized that I was acting in an utterly selfish and foolish way. I was completely ignoring the opportunity God had brought before me.

As a young Christian, I knew the importance not only of studying the Bible, but also sharing my faith. I was committed to telling others about Jesus, and I often prayed God would give me opportunities to share. However, I would come to see that I was often self-focused and oblivious to the things God was doing around me. Thankfully, God was gracious to allow me to grow in this.

We have opportunities every day to share Jesus, but if we aren't paying attention, we can easily miss them. God works through us to share the gospel with the people He wants to draw to Himself. We need to be ready to share.



Day One 1 JOHN 1:1a

John began his gospel account with these words: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1). In this letter written to the church, John began with a similar idea—that Jesus has existed from the very beginning. Jesus was present before the creation of the world. Jesus was alive before He became a man and entered into our experience. In fact, because Jesus is God. He has existed not only throughout the history of the world, but for eternity past. In a world where things change, often more quickly than we can keep up with, Jesus has always been around, and He is faithful and unchanging. This is the reason our hope is secure in Christ—everything else may fall apart, but Jesus will always be with us.

How have you experienced the world's being highly unstable?

Day Two 1 JOHN 1:1b



In chapter 1 of John's gospel, he went on to share that the Word became flesh and lived among us so we could clearly see the character and person of God (v. 14). In this passage, John shared that those who were alive during Jesus' life on earth were able to hear, see, and touch the One who had been alive for eternity. Jesus is the Word made flesh, and the message He proclaimed—the gospel—is the truth that allows people to experience the life that God has desired for us all along. Jesus not only spoke about the kingdom of God, but He lived as a perfect representation of God's nature in human form. In Christ, God made it possible that we could receive eternal life.

Why did Jesus become flesh and live among us?

What is the "word of life" that Jesus shared?

Day Three 1 JOHN 1:2

When God created Adam and Eve, they enjoyed a whole relationship with God and experienced the life that God desires for all people. However, when they chose sin, they were cut off from this blessed existence, and instead, experienced the curse of sin with its frustrations and pains and ultimately death. Since the fall, no person has ever experienced life as God intended—at least, not in this lifetime. However, when Jesus came, because He was conceived by the Spirit and lived in perfect, wholehearted obedience to the Father, sin had no claim on Him. Jesus is the only person to live a truly blessed life—one in which the Father is fully pleased. We witness His life through the Scriptures, and if we trust in Him for salvation, we will share in His blessings for eternity.

Day Four 1 JOHN 1:3a

John shared with the church that he and others had known Jesus while He was on the earth. He had the privilege of observing the ways Jesus lived and hearing the message Jesus taught. Now, John was sharing the things he'd seen and heard with the people he cared about deeply. John knew just how important that gospel was. In fact, sharing the gospel was the mission Jesus had entrusted to His followers, and this is our mission today. For people to trust Jesus and be restored in their relationship with God, they must hear the message, and without our sharing, they will never hear it. At times, the thought of talking about spiritual things may make us a little uncomfortable. However, it doesn't have to be this way. If Jesus is the most important thing in our lives—and as Christians, He is!—then it should be natural to talk about Him with others. Plus, we know that our friends and loved ones' eternities depend on their hearing about Jesus Let's be the ones to tell them.

What is your reaction to the idea of sharing about Jesus with your friends?

When was the last time you shared your faith? How did the hearer respond?

Day Five

1 JOHN 1:3b



There was a specific reason that John shared about Jesus with the people he cared about—so they would have fellowship with one another. We often think of fellowship as simply spending time together, and in a certain sense, this is true. However, real Christian fellowship implies two specific things. First, fellowship involves being together in pursuit of a common goal—being on mission together. Second, and more importantly, it only happens when people are united by faith in Jesus and by the power of the Spirit. John knew that this happens only when people believe the gospel. He wanted so desperately to have fellowship with the people he loved, so he continually talked about Jesus. It is right for us to live this same way.

The POINT>

Share Christ in all situations, but leave the results to God.

> MATTHEW 13:3-8,18-23

Then he told them many things in parables, saying, "Consider the sower who went out to sow. 4 As he sowed, some seed fell along the path, and the birds came and devoured them. 5 Other seed fell on rocky ground where it didn't have much soil, and it grew up quickly since the soil wasn't deep. 6 But when the sun came up, it was scorched, and since it had no root, it withered away. Other seed fell among thorns, and the thorns came up and choked it. 8 Still other seed fell on good ground and produced fruit: some a hundred, some sixty, and some thirty times what was sown.

¹⁸ "So listen to the parable of the sower: ¹⁹ When anyone hears the word about the kingdom and doesn't understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what was sown in his heart. This is the one sown along the path. ²⁰ And the one sown on rocky ground—this is one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy. ²¹ But he has no root and is short-lived. When distress or persecution comes because of the word, immediately he falls away. 22 Now the one sown among the thorns—this is one who hears the word, but the worries of this age and the deceitfulness of wealth choke the word, and it becomes unfruitful. 23 But the one sown on the good ground—this is one who hears and understands the word, who does produce fruit and yields: some a hundred, some sixty, some thirty times what was sown."

A bucket list is a checklist of activities or tasks a person wants to complete before the end of this life. There are loads of books and blogs filled with bucket-list ideas: One hundred places to visit before you die. One hundred books to read before you die. One hundred foods to try, movies to see, adventures to go on, and on and on.

Some people create their lists just for fun while others take it quite seriously. Few people complete their bucket list unless it consists of only "low hanging fruit"—things that are fairly easy to accomplish. Whether we complete our lists or not, inasmuch as we receive the experiences with gratitude, it's generally good to have these kinds of goals and to pursue experiencing the rich life God has made available to us.

As cool as it is to summit a mountain, swim with dolphins, or visit the pyramids, one thing that should be on every Christ-follower's bucket list is leading others to faith. This experience impacts not only this life, but it also makes a difference for eternity—in our own lives, as well as those we lead to faith! It's great to enjoy the world which God created as "very good," but let's make sure we prioritize the eternal even more than the here and now.

LEVELS OF BIBLICAL LEARNING // CREATION

People are God's most loved creation and have been given responsibility for overseeing His creation. As we steward it for His purposes, we reflect God's character and authority.

God has entrusted to us the treasure of the gospel. He has also entrusted to us oversight of His creation. This means that we are responsible to share the gospel with our words, and we are to reflect God's character in all the ways we live. It's always both—words and actions. When we live out these specific aspects of God's calling on our lives, He will use us to draw others to Himself.

> CHRIST

In the parable of the soils, there is fruitless soil (hard, rocky, and thorn-infested) and good soil. If we're Christians, then we are certainly the good soil. Still, we must consider if we're highly productive—the 100 times soil—or less productive.

Be honest with yourself and with God. Which kind of soil are you? How would you rate your fruitfulness for the gospel?

What steps do you need to take in order to be more fruitful for the kingdom?

Pray that Jesus would help you to be fruitful.

>COMMUNITY

For soil to be fruitful, it must be prepared. In our lives, God uses His Word and the Holy Spirit, as well as other people, to cultivate our hearts that we would live productive lives.

>CULTURE

Jesus came to earth to spread the seeds of the gospel. He is the Sower, and He's invited us to take part in His mission. When we share the gospel, the seeds will often fall on soil that isn't receptive or which doesn't produce healthy fruit. Still, we are called to share freely.

Make a goal, specifically the number of times you'll commit to sharing the gospel in the next 30 days. (Spreading seeds freely would mean setting a high number.) You'll experience rejection. Don't be discouraged—Jesus faced rejection, too!

How many times will you commit to sharing?

14 At the end of the 30 days, make sure to write down both the struggles you faced, as well as victories you experienced. (A victory doesn't necessarily have to be someone's coming to faith. Your sharing is in and of itself something to celebrate as it's a lost person's willingness to listen.)

Day One

1 CORINTHIANS 3:5

Paul wrote these verses to deal specifically with a challenging situation in the Corinthian church. Apollos was a Jew who had come to faith in Christ and had a powerful evangelistic ministry. He had traveled to Corinth to preach, and some from the church particularly appreciated Apollos' ministry and devoted themselves to following him. Others loved Paul and chose to follow him. refusing to listen to Apollos. From these different perspectives, division had grown in the church. Paul wrote to the church to let them know that they should devote themselves to neither himself nor Apollos. They were simply servants to the One whom the people should really follow— Jesus. Today, we must be careful about the ways we follow other people. It's okay to appreciate the ministry of a particular music artist, and we should certainly honor and follow the spiritual leaders God has placed in our lives. However, ultimately, we must understand that it is Jesus, and Jesus alone, who deserves our devotion.

When have you seen these kinds of preferences create division among Christians?

Day Two

1 CORINTHIANS 3:6



A farmer must carry out a variety of specific responsibilities in order to produce a healthy crop—remove rocks, till the soil, add fertilizer, plant the seed, water continuously, pull weeds, and more. And after he does all this, the farmer expects (and hopes) that the seeds will grow into healthy plants and produce fruit, but the truth is, he can't simply make that happen. The farmer's job is to create the conditions necessary for producing fruit, but there are parts of the process that are simply outside of his control. It's the same with people's coming to faith. Paul and Apollos were servants who did their part in creating conditions that would allow people to come to faith. However, it was God who produced the fruit of faith in the hearts of lost people.

Day Three 1 CORINTHIANS 3:7

There are some people who focus on our being created in God's image—the fact that we're children of the King of the universe and God considered us worthy of paying the ultimate price to purchase us out of slavery and they conclude, "My worth is beyond measure." There are others who focus on our brokenness and the fact that we disobev God over and over. It's absolutely impossible that we could ever live up to God's standards, and they conclude, "I'm a worm." The truth is, both are right. It's a matter of context. When Paul says that those who share the gospel are nothing, he doesn't mean that we have no value. What he's saying is that no matter what we do, it's up to God to create faith in an unbelieving heart. There's nothing that any person can do to bring the spiritually dead to life. Compared to God, we bring no value to the mission of changing lives. This is why it's such a great honor that God chooses to use us anyway.

Day Four 1 CORINTHIANS 3:8

Scripture speaks of every Christian's having a gift from the Holy Spirit, and though there are different gifts, they help the many members of the church to function together for one purpose (1 Cor. 12:4). Paul planted seeds of the gospel. Apollos watered those seeds in helping create conditions in which fruit could grow. And by doing what God had called them to, they were part of the same mission. As members of the body of Christ, we are called to work together in carrying out His mission. Still, we must understand that we're each rewarded (or judged) individually based on our living faithfully according to God's call on our lives. Notice, the eternal rewards we receive from God are not based on success, but on our labor—the degree to which we serve God faithfully during our lives on earth. God is pleased with our faithfulness, and when we obey, God works through us to produce fruit in the lives of the lost.

How are you continually laboring to share the gospel with the lost?

How does it make you feel to know that your eternal rewards will be based on your sowing seeds of the gospel in this life?

Day Five

1 CORINTHIANS 3:9



The term "coworkers" does not mean that we are God's partners, but that we are His servants working under His guidance. Still, it does imply that God uses us in meaningful ways in accomplishing His purposes. Could God call people to Himself without using us? Of course! But He has chosen, nonetheless, to work through us in reconciling people to Himself. According to God's design, for the lost to be saved, they must hear the gospel. For them to hear, we must share it. The hearts of the lost are the soil and the field where seeds need to be planted. Let's commit to spreading seeds among as many hearts as possible. We will be rewarded, and perhaps more importantly, the lost will be saved. This is our purpose.
